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first published in 1981 this book is a collection of the papers presented at the sixteenth annual carnegie symposium on cognition held in may 1980

researchers examining children s mathematics acquisition are now questioning the belief that children learn mathematics principally through formalized in school mathematics education there is increasing evidence that children gain mathematical

understanding through their participation in out of school cultural practices and that their mathematics only occasionally resembles what they learn in the classroom culture and cognitive development presents the latest research by dr geoffrey saxe on this issue in examinations of the mathematical understandings of child candy sellers in an urban center in northeastern brazil dr saxe finds sharp contrasts between mathematics as practiced in school and in real world settings in this unique research project he presents a penetrating conceptual treatment of the interplay between culture and cognitive development filling a void in current research literature subjects examined include the interplay between sociocultural and cognitive developmental processes the differences between math knowledge learned in and out of the classroom the ways math learning in the classroom is modified by children s out of school mathematics and correspondingly how practical out of school mathematics use is modified by formal education

papers commissioned for the conference on title convened april 1988 in san diego calif to explore whether the field of cognitive science might offer perspectives that would aid in the development of more effective interventions for improving the cognitive ability of american children youth and

the relationship between thinking skills and content knowledge has engaged the attention of teachers from confucius to the present day the authors of this book present modern perspectives on this and a number of other critical issues in teaching and learning cognitive skills the issues all have relevance for teachers curriculum developers and policy makers in what ways and along what pathways do cognitive skills develop as children grow up how are such skills to be assessed how can school education help are cognitive skills best learnt in the context of individual school subjects or can they be taught independently and later applied to particular areas are thinking strategies better taught explicitly or should teaching and the curriculum be so arranged that children find rich opportunities to invent their own strategies to what extent are thinking skills determined by expertise in the particular domain of knowledge how should we plan for transfer to other areas and how can transfer of thinking strategies from one area to another be assessed

part of a two volume work taken from the proceedings of the international conference on thinking held at the university of aberdeen in august 1988 this book explores current empirical and theoretical research in human thinking this volume particularly considers such complex processes as skilled thinking emotion and thought creative processes individual differences and teaching thinking the book has been organized into themes so that topics of increasing complexity are considered in the later sections of text

a new understanding of cognitive development from the perspective of neuroscience this book provides a state of the art understanding of the neural bases of cognitive development although the field of developmental cognitive neuroscience is still in its infancy the authors effectively demonstrate that our understanding of cognitive development is and will be vastly improved as the

mechanisms underlying development are elucidated the authors begin by establishing the value of considering neuroscience in order to understand child development and then provide an overview of brain development they include a critical discussion of experience dependent changes in the brain the authors explore whether the mechanisms underlying developmental plasticity differ from those underlying adult plasticity and more fundamentally what distinguishes plasticity from development having armed the reader with key neuroscience basics the book begins its examination of the neural bases of cognitive development by examining the methods employed by professionals in developmental cognitive neuroscience following a brief historical overview the authors discuss behavioral anatomic metabolic and electrophysiological methods finally the book explores specific content areas focusing on those areas where there is a significant body of knowledge on the neural underpinnings of cognitive development including declarative and non declarative memory and learning spatial cognition object recognition social cognition speech and language development attention development for cognitive and developmental psychologists as well as students in developmental psychology neuroscience and cognitive development the authors view of behavioral development from the perspective of neuroscience sheds new light on the mechanisms that underlie how the brain functions and how a child learns and behaves

this book examines the fundamental role of politics in funding our public schools and fills a conceptual imbalance in the current literature in school finance and educational policy unlike those who are primarily concerned about cost efficiency kenneth wong specifies how resources are allocated for what purposes at different levels of the government in contrast to those who focus on litigation as a way to reduce funding gaps he underscores institutional stalemate and the lack of political will to act as important factors that affect legislative deadlock in school finance reform wong defines how politics has sustained various types of rules that affect the allocation of resources at the federal state and local level while these rules have been remarkably stable over the past twenty to thirty years they have often worked at cross purposes by fragmenting policy and constraining the education process at schools with the greatest needs wong s examination is shaped by several questions how do these rules come about what role does politics play in retention of the rules do the federal state and local governments espouse different policies in what ways do these policies operate at cross purposes how do they affect educational opportunities do the policies cohere in ways that promote better and more equitable student outcomes wong concludes that the five types of entrenched rules for resource allocation are rooted in existing governance arrangements and seemingly impervious to partisan shifts interest group pressures and constitutional challenge and because these rules foster policy fragmentation and embody initiatives out of step with the performance based reform agenda of the 1990s the outlook for positive change in public education is uncertain unless fairly radical approaches are employed wong also analyzes four allocative reform models two based on the assumption that existing political structures are unlikely to change and two that seek

to empower actors at the school level the two models for systemwide restructuring aimed at intergovernmental coordination and or integrated governance would seek to clarify responsibilities for public education among federal state and local authorities above all integrating political and educational accountability the other two models identified by wong shift control from state and district to the school one based on local leadership and the other based on market forces in discussing the guiding principles of the four models wong takes care to identify both the potential and limitations of each written with a broad policy audience in mind wong s book should appeal to professionals interested in the politics of educational reform and to teachers of courses dealing with educational policy and administration and intergovernmental relations

emerging themes in cognitive development volumes i and ii offer the full spectrum of current knowledge and research trends in cognitive developmental psychology the first volume provides a foundation by describing key discoveries in new areas of research and by thoroughly examining fundamental aspects of the field including several demonstrations of formal modeling the gains in prediction and precision that can be won by such mathematical analyses are the hallmark of cognitive development as a maturing science the second volume traces the development of cognitive competence denoting a change or increment in cognitive proficiency understanding or mastery and includes analyses of innovative and previously unpublished studies the primary challenge issued by many of the authors in this volume is to ensure the incorporation of new knowledge into educational practices these volumes which are milestones in cognitive developmental psychology interest every researcher in the field

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
